The Board of Elders (BOE) is the highest ruling body in BCEC. It is “responsible for carrying out the purpose of BCEC by overseeing the spiritual growth of BCEC through articulating and teaching Biblical doctrines; providing discipleship training and discipline; developing vision, philosophy of ministry, and strategic long-term plans for the ministry of BCEC; and determining the staffing needs.”

The BOE is currently composed of 10 members: 6 elders who are pastors and 4 lay elders. The pastors are Pastors Steven Chin, Daniel Chan, Kenneth Kwong, Enoch Liao, Andy Su, and Barry Lam. The lay elders are Brian Hui, Chuk-Lam Yuen, Jack Lee, and Bak Fun Wong.

This past year, the BOE spent time dealing with a number of issues, including the following:

- Ministry planning, including developing the annual churchwide theme, reviewing the ministries for all seven congregations, considering ways to increase the efficiency of ministries, and considering different models for our Newton English congregation before setting the job description
- Personnel, including the hiring of an interim pastor, approving the job description for the Newton English Pastor and Newton Mandarin Pastor positions, development of a short-term and long-term plan for staffing, and continued succession planning for the eventual retirement of the senior pastor
- Expansion, especially the feasibility of consolidating all our Chinatown ministries into 120 Shawmut Ave. and the consideration of potential collaboration with our neighbors on building projects
- Outside Rental of BCEC Facilities Policy (approved)
- Use of credit cards for donations and for fees (approved)
- Security at our various facilities
- Team building and self-evaluation by participating in a churchwide leadership retreat and studying together the 5 Dysfunctions of a Team
- Theology, including transgender issues and the involvement of the church in affecting public policy and involvement in ecumenical unity events

Please continue to pray for the Board of Elders. Despite appearances, it is a diverse group with different perspectives. Pray for wisdom and discernment to know the Lord’s leading for our church into the future, especially as our church grows in complexity. Pray for continued unity in making decisions for the church.

Our mission is to support and provide the best environment and tools for our leadership, as well as brothers and sisters to actualize God's purpose in BCEC. Every year, we initiate many improvement projects. This year, in response to the feedback from our congregations, we worked on few additional improvements. I would like to share with you what we did in the past year in the following areas: operational efficiency, support for staff, church security, cost saving, and hiring and expansion in Chinatown.

Operational Efficiency

As the structure of our church is becoming more complex (4 buildings, 7 congregations, and 3 languages), we are encountering challenges with our existing resources. As a result, we need to provide more



efficient processes for our ministries. Some of the projects we worked on include the following:

- Simplified tax receipt distribution
- Online Giving
- Revived communication/presentation method for our monthly financial report
- Electronic Room Reservation system (Phase 1 for 120 Shawmut Ave. and rolling out for Newton Campus and Chinatown Campus' 237/249 buildings)
- Automatic Sermon Recording upload for Mandarin and Cantonese 2nd Service

Support for staff

- Converted regular land phone line to IP phone system
- All Chinatown Campus pastoral staff members have been relocated to the 3rd floor at 120 Shawmut Ave. This marks the first time all staff are working under the same roof for better support and communication.
- Compensation/benefit analysis to ensure our staff are sufficiently supported.

Security

- Electronic check in/check out system for children ministry
- Install/improve security camera system at Newton Campus and our 249 Harrison Ave. main building (Chinatown Campus)
- Improve internet connection and security

Cost Saving

- Replaced older fluorescent lighting with energy-saving LED lights.
- Replaced older thermostats with Wi-Fi control programmable thermostats instead.

Hiring

- With two positions to be filled (English pastor for Newton Campus and Mandarin Pastor for Newton Campus), our personnel deacons and the searching committee are working diligently to seek God's guidance. Please continue to pray for them and the prospective candidates.

Expansion of Chinatown Campus

- PDA application with our 120 Shawmut Ave. neighbor developers.
- Completion of 120 Shawmut Ave. 2nd floor East wings renovation

In the upcoming year, Board of Deacons will continue to support our ministries for God's glory. We do ask for your continual prayers and support, as we will encounter various challenges. As a body of Christ, we are here to facilitate the fulfillment of BCEC role's in expanding God's Kingdom according to His plan.

REPORT FROM THE SENIOR PASTOR

Pastor Steven Chin



Our personal perception of our church is certainly influenced by when we first came to the church. Our church was started in 1961 with 18 people meeting in a home. For the founders of BCEC, they never dreamed that, in their lifetime, the church would grow to over 1000 people, spread over 7 congregations, using three languages.

I have been blessed to serve on the pastoral staff since 1977. As I look back at what God has done in the past 40 years, I am in awe of the power and grace of God, as He has grown and guided the church using imperfect people, myself included.

When I started serving on the paid staff of the church, I joined founding pastor, James Tan. We had no building of our own to worship in. We worshipped in a rented part of the Pine Street Inn. It was not a hotel, but a homeless shelter. There was just one worship service comprised of about 120 people. The worship was in Cantonese, translated into English. There was no adequate space for children's ministries. Many of the young people dropped out because their needs were not being met. There was a constant concern of having enough money to keep the church afloat. The church just struggled to survive.

As I look at our church today, I certainly see lots of needs. There are a lot of concerns and lots of things that need improvement. Nevertheless, I also have a sense of gratefulness for how the Lord has blessed our church. I also have faith in an all-powerful God in whom we can depend upon for all our needs.

As I reflect on the past year of the church, numerically, some congregations have experienced declines, while others have grown. Overall, the average Sunday adult worship attendance for the whole church (1096 people) has been about the same for the past several years. We have fluctuated around 1100 people since 2004. Certainly, the spiritual climate in the nation and in the Boston area has been increasingly challenging for churches that adhere to God's unchanging Word.

Yes, some of us need to get involved in serving. Yes, some of us can work harder and some more efficiently. Yes, some of us need to be better stewards of the materialistic blessings God has given us.

But most importantly, we need to pray. If we want spiritual breakthrough, we need to get on our knees.

Paul reminded us we are in a spiritual battle in Ephesians 6:12 (ESV), "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places."

We have also recently lost key pastoral staff (Pastor Tom Lee, Vivian Cheung, and Minister Peter Wong) without any replacements at this time. This has put increased strain on our remaining pastoral staff and our lay workers. Even if our individual congregation is not directly affected, there is an effect on all the congregations and on the church

at large. We need to pray together that the Lord will provide the right people to join our leadership team according to His timing.

Besides our desire to grow in number, we want to grow spiritually as well. Our theme for the new year is “Following Jesus Together: Celebrating our Unity in Diversity.” Despite what people on the outside may think because most look alike, we are a diverse church. We have different language and cultures, different perspectives, different values, different styles, different emphases, and different ways of doing things. Yet we are united in Christ. He is the one we seek to glorify. Satan will want to use our differences to divide us. There will always be issues coming up that can potentially divide us. We must not allow internal disagreements to distract us from our common goal of making disciples for God’s glory. Therefore, we need to pray for unity for the church as Jesus did (John 17).

In terms of facilities, we thank the Lord that the renovations to 120 Shawmut Ave. has given us better space to minister. However, it is still lacking in a large worship space. The leadership has been working to put the church in position to have more options in the future. The development of the Ink Block area is both an opportunity and a challenge. We need wisdom to navigate through the new changes.

Finally, I am grateful for all who serve, who give, and who pray for the ministries of BCEC. Many of you have served for years and years. Thank you! Let me encourage you from God’s Word.

Galatians 6:9 (ESV): “And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up.”

Paul uses a farming analogy. We may work hard in planting seeds, but we may not see the spiritual fruit right away. Do not give up. We are promised that in due season, we will reap. Our hope is in the Lord.

REPORT FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

BCEC is a church with 7 congregations using 3 languages. Some people see this as a burden on church administration and management of resources. But looking at it positively, each congregation has its special characters and strengths. The congregations can enrich and support each other. From this perspective, the Board of Elders came up with this year's churchwide theme: "Following Christ Together: Celebrating Our Unity in Diversity." Our goal is to promote mutual appreciation and cooperation among our congregations on the all-important base of following Christ.

Regarding the Chinese Staff, Pastor Barry Lam took his first sabbatical leave from June to August this year. During that time, he went to Asia for a short-term missions trip to visit our long-term missionaries. After serving over 3 years at BCEC, Minister Peter Wong felt God's calling to focus on overseas missions and stepped down from his ministry with the Newton Mandarin congregation back in September. We are going to miss him. But we are sure that God will use him mightily in another area of His Kingdom. Please pray for our recruitment of a new Mandarin minister. Meanwhile, I will be covering Peter's job with help from Pastor Andy and Pastor Barry.

The total number of attendees in the Chinese congregations decreased by 2 people last year. Below are some statistics:

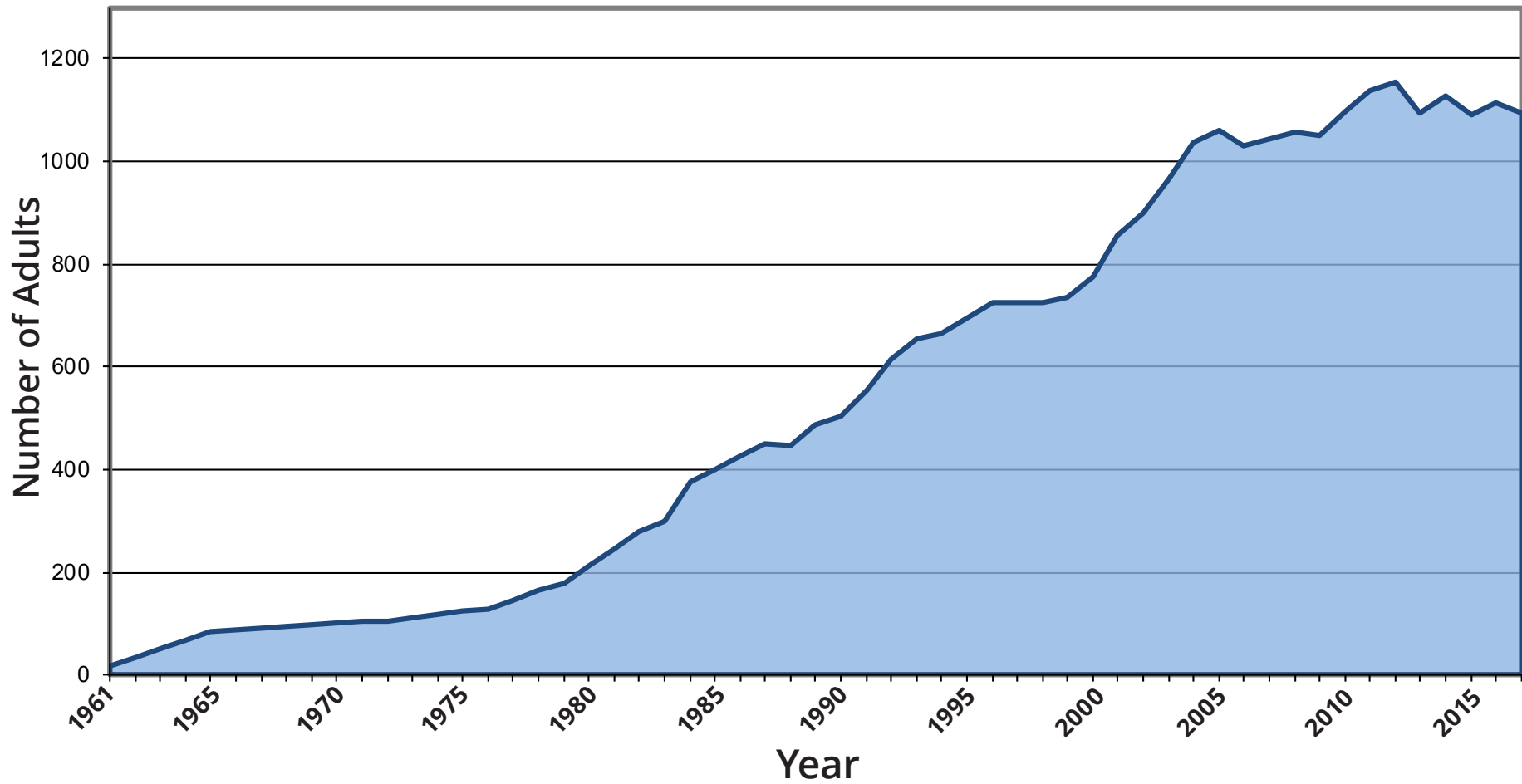

I greatly appreciate the brothers and sisters from 3rd service who have willingly served as church deacons over the many years past. Although they were already very busy in both their personal lives and serving at church, they still willingly readjusted their schedules to dedicate additional time to serve as deacons. Their willing hearts reflect a commitment and passion towards the church and serve as great examples for all. May God bless their service to the church as well as their personal lives.

God also raised up more brothers and sisters with a servant heart for everyone. Our younger generation has taken on many important roles in the congregation. Every week's service — from worship leading to sound control, from manning the projector to presiding, from welcoming newcomers to ushering, and even in clean up — is filled with these brothers and sisters' hard work and sweat. Sunday service continues to be held week after week because of their dedication and faithful service. At the same time, these brothers and sisters have also participated in and taken on important roles in other ministries and major church events such as the Mid-Autumn Festival, local missions, Stephen Ministry, visitations, Adult Sunday School, Local Evangelism Department (LED), Social Responsibility Committee (SRC), and the service teams of various fellowships. These ministries not only benefit the Cantonese 3rd service but other congregations as well. I believe that their service is a fragrant offering in God's sight, pleasing to the Him, as it is written in Romans 12:1: "...to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God — this is your true and proper worship."

As everyone is hard at work in serving the church, the biggest challenge is for these brothers and sisters to maintain a close relationship

with the Lord — to gain strength from Him as they confront the fatigue in body, mind, and spirit that comes from continuous service. The Lord Jesus promised that rivers of living water would flow from within us. This "living water" refers to the Holy Spirit who lives in us and continuously nourishes us for growth (John 7:38-39). In his journey of serving the Lord, the prophet Elijah at one point became discouraged to the point of wishing for death. Before that, he had strong hopes of making great strides in his service by leading the Israelites back to God. However, when his defeat of the prophets of Baal merely brought forth a death threat upon himself, he became greatly discouraged and lost his will to fight. How did God restore him? God revealed His presence and command to Elijah through a vision. Although it was only in a whisper, it allowed Elijah to experience God's might and glory. It is neither God's will nor ours if we stand by and do not make any progress. May we come together in prayer for God to add to us the salvation of more people, so that our invitations will not be in vain.

Sunday’s flow control is no longer the same as that of the past. In addition, the layout of the building is not suitable for our needs. In



several places, the paint is peeling off and requires repairs. In the coming days, we need to examine how we are going to renovate the building step by step. When we manage well the House of the Lord it will help the participants in their worship, their fellowship and their learning.

3. Plan and develop effective discipleship training

The life of a healthy disciple should be able to reproduce other disciples. The life of Christ in us will grow through the work of the Holy Spirit and in our sanctification so that our life may manifest the glory of God and influence others to become more like Christ. May the theme of the coming year, “Following Jesus Together: Celebrating Our Unity in Diversity” be helpful to us in focusing on the importance of discipleship training and together we will expand God’s kingdom.

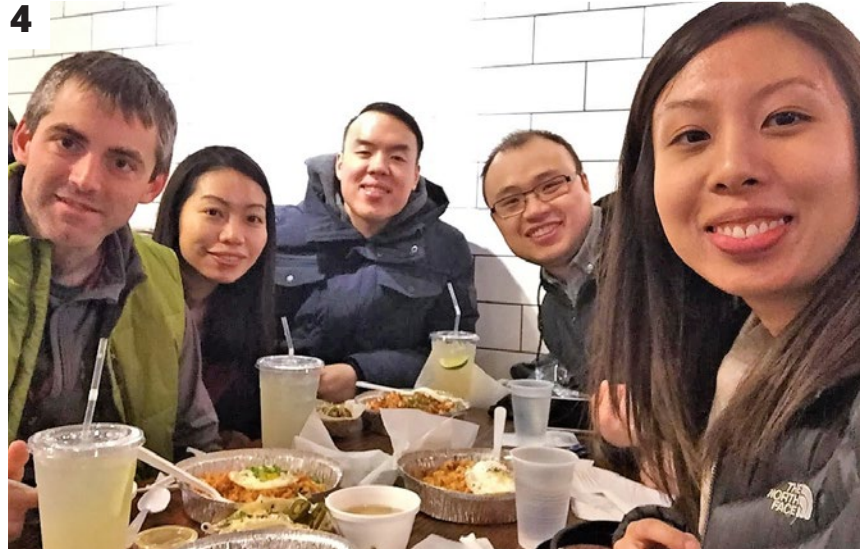

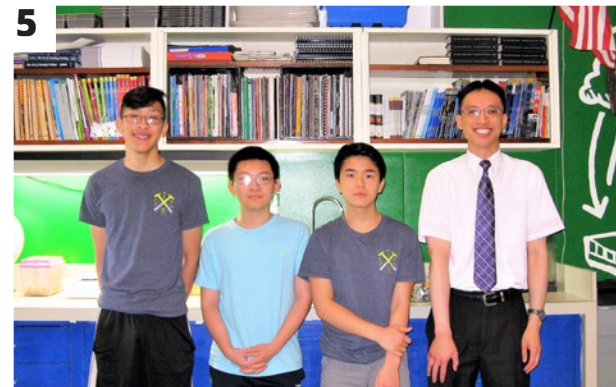

1-3) Chinatown Cantonese Adult Sunday School 4-6) Chinatown Vacation Bible School: Loads of fun at Maker Fun Factory. Children learned that we are all created by a creative God for a purpose. They engaged in hands-on activities and experiential learning. In addition to interactive bible lessons, they enjoyed games, competed to build the sturdiest tower with scrap materials, made Chinese and Japanese art, launched rockets, built simple robots, and created web pages.

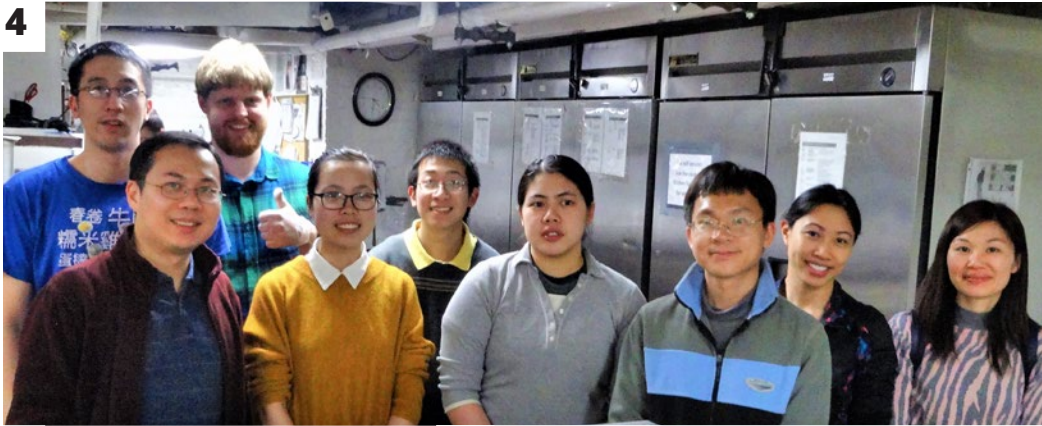

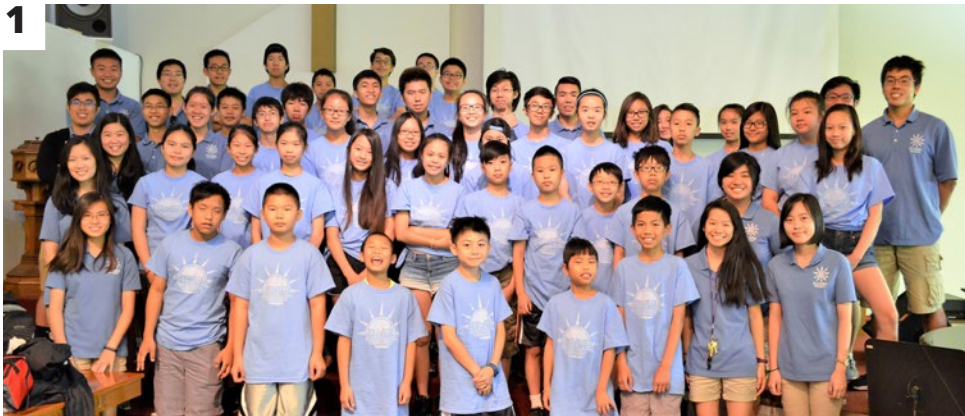

Praise God for His faithfulness and provision for BCEC. Thanks to all the ministry leaders for their flexibility in meeting in different locations while focusing on ministries. Despite all of these challenges, we are able to continue growing our ministries and expanding our service to our community.

With the new facility at 120 Shawmut Ave., we are continuing to renovate and update as more existing church and community ministries are moving in. We are also blessed with new ministries starting in this new building. Groups like Love Knitting Group, which is organized the Local Evangelism Department, the children's music program, and Listening and Inner Healing Prayer Pioneer Group have all been established and regularly meet there. We are also partnering with the Chinatown Respite Care (CRC) to host their activities for the special needs children in the community. In the fall, the Chinatown Campus Children's ministry has moved the preschool and elementary Kids Worship and Children's Sunday School to 120 Shawmut Ave. Many thanks to all who helped prepare the space for these transitions, allowing us to use the space God has provided to be a blessing to the community.

BCEC's programs are spanning over five buildings in Chinatown. To consolidate all our Chinatown ministries into one facility would reduce costs, as well as to more efficiently use our resources. Such consolidation would involve adding multiple large worship spaces, a dedicated Christian education space, a community outreach space, and other improvements to 120 Shawmut Ave. Previously, the church leadership put the project on hold due to the high cost of construction.

Throughout our journey in addressing our facility needs, God has opened and closed doors. Just over a year ago, our neighbors at 112 Shawmut Ave. invited us and Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association (CCBA) to jointly file a Planned Development Area (PDA) application with the City of Boston involving their properties as well as 120 Shawmut Ave. The PDA is a zoning change application, allowing for two

or more parties with adjacent properties to file for potential projects on their individual sites. The benefits of participating in the PDA are to ensure development potential for the site and help protect against changes that could affect our future expansion. These benefits will provide flexibility in creating more ministries and outreach programs in the future while addressing the consolidation of our Chinatown facilities. Submission and successful approval of the PDA does not mean we must start a building project immediately, but it does mean that we will be able to retain the benefit of zoning changes for the future. Before BCEC actually starts a new building project, the church will still have to go through many steps, including leadership and congregation approval and fundraising.

On September 14, 2017, the Board of Elders and the Board of Deacon voted unanimously to approve the application for the PDA on 120 Shawmut Ave.

Please continue to pray for the leaders, as they proceed with submitting this application. Please also pray for our neighbors, as we discuss how we can help the community and be a blessing to the people around us as part of the PDA process.

Separate from the PDA process, we have been contacted recently by the city regarding its potential interest in building a new Josiah Quincy High School on the whole city block of which 249 Harrison Ave. is a part. Since this is a new topic, much more needs to be done before BCEC can evaluate this situation.

We will continue to update you on the progress of any expansion activities or opportunities through bulletin updates and town hall meetings. If you have any questions or thoughts, please reach out to our church's elders, deacons, or pastors. Most importantly, please continue to pray for these matters.
